



OUR INSTITUTION

1.1 History of the Institution

Victoria Institution, originally named as The Native Ladies Normal and Adult School. was founded on 1st February, 1871, by Brahmananda Keshub Chandra Sen under the auspices of the Indian Reform Association of which he was the President. The aim of the Institution as laid down by Keshub Chandra Sen was to build up a scheme of education "specially adapted requirement of the female mind and calculated to fit woman for her position in the society." Education, he said, should be "both natural and national" and his followers pursued the aim with apostolic fervour while nurturing the Institution.



In 1932, the college section of the Institution was set up under the patronage of Maharani Suniti Devi, Maharani Sucharu Devi (daughters of Keshub Chandra) and other Board members among whom was Dr. Bidhan Chandra Roy who took keen interest in the growth of the Institution and remained associated with it till death.

The college which started I.A. course in 1932 soon became the first-grade women's college teaching up to B.A. Honours course in several subjects (1935). The science section of the college was opened in 1950. To meet the growing demand from the girls aspiring for higher education the Morning Section of the college was opened in 1963. In the Platinum Jubilee Year (2006-07) the college introduced B.Com. (Honours) course. At present the college has Arts, Science and Commerce sections conducting Honours and General courses for more than 2000 students. It is also a study center for distance education of Netaji Subhas Open University.

Over the years the goals and objectives of Victoria Institution (College) have been redefined keeping in mind Women's growing role in different sectors of public life. But Keshub Chandra Sen's "comprehensive scheme of education" through special lectures, distance education ('antapur shiksha'), vocational training and physical training still forms the core of the education system of Victoria Institution (College).

For nine decades Victoria Institution (College) has been rendering commendable service for the promotion of women's education in Bengal combining tradition with modernisation. The mission of the college is to realize the founder's dream of creating a generation of empowered women.

Discipline Specific Core Course (DSCC): A course, to be compulsorily studied by a student as a core requirement of the Major subject.

Minor: A subject of same broad discipline to be studied by the student with lesser number of courses other than the major subject.

Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) courses are the courses based on the knowledge of languages. There shall be two AEC courses:

a) Compulsory English

b) MIL/ Alternative English; MIL includes: Bengali, Hindi & Urdu.

Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): SEC courses are based upon skill enhancement. Student shall study 2 SECs based on Major subjects in 1st and 3rd semester. In the 2nd semester the student can study Artificial Intelligence (for Science discipline) or Digital Empowerment (for Humanities & Language discipline) or as specified in the syllabus of the concerned Major subject.

Practical/ Tutorial: All courses other than AEC & CVAC will have one Practical/ Tutorial.

Common Value Added Course (CVAC): There shall be 4 CVAC courses of 2 credits each. In the 1st semester, 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & another one in CVAC in Constitutional Values. In the 2nd semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & the students shall select the other CVAC from a pool of courses.

Summer Internship: All the students are required to do one 3 credits Summer Internship at the end of the 2^{nd} or 4^{th} or 6^{th} semester.

Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC): There shall be 3 IDCs of 3 credits each, to be studied in the first 3 semesters. The students shall take IDC from the different subjects other than the Major and Minor subjects.

Research/ Dissertation:

- a) Students obtaining CGPA equivalent to 75% marks after successful completion of all the first 6
- semesters may opt for Honours with research Degree Course in the 7^{th} & 8^{th} Semester.
- b) Students choosing a 4-year Bachelor's degree (Single major with Research course) are required
- to take up research projects under the guidance of a faculty member. The students shall have to complete the Research in the 7th & 8th semester of 4credits and 8 credits respectively.
- c) Students pursuing 4-year Single major Degree without Research shall have to take up to 1 additional DSCC (should be a Project work/ dissertation & the course will be of 4 credits) in 7th semester and 2 additional DSCCs (courses are of 4 credits each and at least one should be a Project Report/ Seminar) in 8th semester.

3. Evaluation System

Victoria Institution (College) focuses on holistic learning and encourages students to think critically. While the College adheres to the evaluation norms prescribed by the University of Calcutta it endeavours to maintain a continuous evaluation system.

- Students are assessed on a continuous basis through innovative and reformed techniques such as group discussions, assignments, analytical tests, presentations, quizzes, practical and projects.
- Identification of slow and advanced learners is made by the faculty on the basis of MCQ tests.
- Class tests are organised by the teachers to carry out regular performance appraisal of the students.
- Remedial classes are used to support learners with different abilities and pace.
 Students with advanced needs are encouraged to research and given more complex tasks.
- All students are encouraged to participate in inter-college competitions to optimize their potential.
- Students are given multiple opportunities to succeed. Through internal assessment students are encouraged and guided to improve their responses with more than one attempt at times.
- Poor performance due to frequent absenteeism is dealt by sending letters to the parents of such students.





5. National Cadet Corps (NCC)

8. FACILITIES

8.1 Library

Victoria Institution (College) has a well-equipped and well-furnished library to cater to the needs and requirements of the students and teachers, towards study and research. The library with its spacious infrastructure, ample seating capacity, a rich collection of books (both in terms of quantity as well as quality) and a quaint ambience, has become a happy space where students can further enrich their intellectual resources – a place where they can spend some quality time, outside class hours.

Special features:

- > A collection of over 42,000 books.
- > A collection of rare books and special collection on Keshub Chandra Sen.
- ➤ Open Access and Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) systems for browsing library resources.
- > Two independent wings for the Day and Morning sections housed in two different sectors with their own infrastructure and staff pattern.
- > Availability of newspapers, periodicals and magazines related to career development and general knowledge.
- > Availability of online resources through N-LIST (INFLIBNET) and Library Facebook page.
- > Reading room facility along with borrowing, internet and photocopy facilities for students and staff.
- > Careful guidance by Librarian and library staff to access all kinds of library facilities.

Apart from the Central Library, all the Departments maintain their respective Seminar Libraries which are equally resourceful, provide subject specific books and are easily accessible by the students.









8.2 Hostel

Since its inception, Victoria Institution (College) Hostel has been engaged in ensuring affordable accommodation facilities for its outstation students. The Hostel is a three storied building with spacious rooms housing nearly 72 students from various parts of Bengal and even other states of India. Being located within the college campus, the resident students do not have to undertake the cumbersome journey to reach their classes everyday.

Over the last few years, extensive refurbishment work has been undertaken. In recent times, the hostel building has been extended to include two dormitories with attached washrooms. However, allocation of these rooms is made in accordance to merit.

A female hostel warden appointed by the college supervises the day-to-day functioning of the Hostel. Principal personally meets the resident students to understand their everyday challenges and occasionally arranges for interactive sessions with their quardians to discuss problems.

Accommodation and Amenities

- Rooms: The rooms have ergonomically designed furniture that include beds, individual Study Desks, lockers and Cupboards with hangers.
- Toilets: The hostel has ample clean toilets with attached baths and solar heaters to provide hot water during winter.
- Reading Room: Every floor of the hostel has a separate reading room. The reading room has computers and free high speed unlimited Wi Fi connection. Boarders can access this room till 12 midnight. In addition, an extended balcony with lights, desks and chairs are also available to facilitate late night study.
- Security: 24×7 security with guards at the main door at all times and CCTVs are installed to monitor entry and exit of the hostel, while maintaining privacy of the residents. After college hours students are allowed to go outside with Gate Pass from the Warden. However, returning to hostel at 8 pm is mandatory.
- Food: Apart from usual lunch and dinner, the hostel mess also serves 2 light meals and one heavy snack after college hours. The students are provided fresh food with nutritive value. Non-vegetarian food consisting of either fish or egg is served everyday. The menu is decided in the beginning of each week, after consultation with the boarders. Special menu is planned for Sundays. The food is served in presence of the Hostel Warden.
- Recreation: The residents have an access to various indoor and outdoor games. Television is installed in the dining area where boarders can watch news everyday and other entertainment programs on Sunday. The boarders also receive the Daily newspaper. Various cultural programmes are also organised to ensure bonding among students.
- The College Hostel is a home-away-from-home. The hostel is a safe space for the students and allows them to embrace an identity of womanhood that is confident, poised and ready to grapple the challenges of the world.
- Hostel seats of students who are unable to qualify at the Calcutta University Examinations will be cancelled.

STUDENTS' HEALTH HOME MEMBERSHIP:

The Institution has long been a Universal Member of Student's Health Home. The boarders can avail this facility and get almost all their medical treatment from this organisation at a very nominal cost.

The Students' Common Room is provided with indoor games and daily newspapers – English, Bengali & Urdu – and is meant for the use of the students during their leisure periods.

• Sanitary napkin vending machines have been installed inside the Students' Common Room.

8.8 Gymnasium and Yoga Room

The college has a gymnasium equipped with exercise bike, tread mill, barbel, dumbbell etc. There is a yoga room that serves as a serene space for meditation.

8.9 Safe drinking water

Automatic water filtration unit is installed in all the blocks, in all student zones. One filtration unit with cooling system is installed in front of student's common room.

8.10 Students' Union

The Students' Union of Victoria Institution (College) is a statutory body and is involved in different activities under the guidance of teachers of the College.

8.11 Universal Membership of Students' Health Home

Victoria Institution (College) has long been a Universal Member of Students' Health Home for which it collects an annual fee of Rs. 10, from each student and the students get almost all their medical treatment from this organization at a very nominal cost. Presently our Institution is under the jurisdiction of Central Kolkata Regional Centre of Students' Health Home, which operates from its Moulali centre. The outdoor clinic remains open from 12 to 2 pm from Monday to Saturday.

Arrangements have been made to introduce Students' Safety Policy with the help of the New Indian Assurance Company Ltd.

8.12 Students' Poor Fund

The college has a students' Aid Fund which extends financial help to students with financial constraints and those who do not get any other scholarships. The objective is to enable them to purchase books and educational aids, meet College Fees, University Examination Fees and other necessary expenses.

In addition to the above Students Medical Benefit Fund formed by the contribution of students. Every student pays Rs. 10 per annum towards the maintenance of the fund. This is a contingency fund created to tackle emergency situations like an accident or a critical medical need faced by any student. A body consisting of the Principal, teaching staff and non-teaching staff oversees the disbursement of the fund.

8.13 Prizes Awarded

Prizes are given to the students of the college for academic excellence and to the meritorious but economically disadvantaged students from the following Funds:

- There is an Endowment Fund for Prizes created from donations made by Sm. Nilima Datta, Ex-Professor, Department of Zoology; Sm. Sukla Sen, Ex-Professor, Department of Sanskrit; the family of Late Dr. Dipali Datta, Ex-Reader, Department of Chemistry for meritorious students pursuing Zoology Honours Course, Sanskrit Honours and B.Sc. General Course with Chemistry respectively.
- There is an Endowment fund, declared in 2020 for prize (book) created from the donation made by Dr. Nibedita Chakrabarti, Ex-Principal, Victoria Institution (College), for the highest scorer in Chemistry Honours, in the memory of her father, Late Sunirmal Mukherjee.
- There is a special fund for Prizes created from the donations made by the family of late Prof. Ratna Sen (Dept. of Philosophy) and the family of the late Dr. Samita Ghosh (Dept. of English) for the highest scorer in Philosophy (Honours) and English (Honours) respectively in the B.A. Examination.
- The teachers and ex-teachers of the College declare many prizes for the rank holders in the various subjects of the University Examination.
- Students securing highest percentage of attendance of each department are awarded a prize in the Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony of the College.

8.14 Special Facilities for differently abled Students

All kinds of help are extended in terms of books, loans and free studentship, concession in hostel charges, etc. to visually and physically challenged students. The college also makes a conscious effort to accommodate these students in the hostel, if required. Such students are requested to contact the office for further details. The college has also divyangjan friendly toilets and facilities like ramps and rails.

8.15 Eco-friendly Measures and Green Campus initiatives

The institution believes in an eco-friendly campus. The college has endeavored to establish "plastic free campus" through regular monitoring. The College has also taken initiatives to include solar panels to facilitate Thermal water heaters and Rain water harvesting.

8.16 Students' Support Cells

Several Students' Support Cells like Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, Women's Cell, Career Counselling Cell (formed in accordance to the guidelines of regulatory bodies, wherein applicable), exist in the College to address any type of queries, needs and complaints of the students and provide them due assistance. Regular sensitization programmes and events are also conducted by some of the cells to generate awareness and keep the students updated.

8.18 SCHOLARSHIPS AND SCHEMES

We at Victoria Institution (College) always try to facilitate all the running schemes provided by Government of West Bengal for the welfare of the students. Given below are the schemes which are currently active:

- **1. West Bengal Student Credit card:** To enable the students to pursue education without having any financial constraints.
- **2. Aikyashree Scholarships:** Scheme is to provide financial assistance as a scholarship to minority students so that they can complete their basic and higher education without thinking about the financial burden.
- a. Post Matric Stipend under Talent Support Program (TSP): For students with less than 50% marks.
- b. Post- Matric Scholarship: For students with marks 50%-59%
- c. SVMCM Scholarship for Minorities students: For students with 60% and above marks.
- **3. Kanyashree Prakalpa:** It is introduced to improve the status and wellbeing of girls, specifically those from socio-economically disadvantaged families through Conditional Cash Transfers. The Kanyashree Prakalpa scheme has two benefit components.
- a. Annual Scholarship:

Annual scholarship to be paid to the girls from the age of 13 to 18, for every year. It helps to ensure that the girls remain in school and unmarried at the time.

- b. On-time Grant:
- Under the Kanyashree Prakalpa Scheme, the one-time grant will be paid to girls between the age of 18 and 19.
- **4. Oasis scholarship:** It enables students belonging to SC, ST and OBC categories of the state to pursue their education with financial assistance.
- **5. Swami Vivekananda Merit Cum Means (SVMCM) Scholarship Scheme:** It is introduced to assist the meritorious students belonging to economically backward families in the State of West Bengal to pursue higher studies.

Apart from all the Govt. sponsored schemes and scholarships, a student can avail the scholarship from College Poor Fund. Students will get 30% concession in admission fees under this scholarship.

8.19 COMPULSORY INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

As per the latest guidelines of University of Calcutta (CCF 2022), a compulsory internship Program should be undertaken within the 6th semester, evaluated during the 2nd, 4th, or 6th semesters, and concluded at least 15 days before the commencement of the concerned end-semester examination. The duration of the internship is between 15 to 30 days. The college has Internship Nodal Officer and Departmental coordinators who offer personalised guidance to students.

- ❖ 1 yr. Diploma Course in (1) Cooperation, (ii) Consumer Affairs.
- ❖ 1 yr. Bachelor of Library and Information Science.
- ❖ Certificate course on Human Rights (6 months).
- Certificate course (six month) on Pre-Primary Teachers' Training (in English and Bengali medium) is conducted on a collaboration basis by the Netaji Subhas Open University, Victoria Institution (College) and Learning and Living Resources Society at the College Study Centre. "The course is designed to impart a thorough and practical training in pre-primary child education based on the Montessori methods. The training provides an excellent foundation for all those who are involved or likely to be involved in pre-primary education, including teachers and parents".
