

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

3.26. Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

1. Three members of the Counselling Cell attended the 26th Career Fair in Kolkata held at the Ice Skating Rink from April 29-30, 2017 to gather experience regarding the organisation of such fairs and also to have an exposure to various institutions and companies that provide professional training and career opportunities for the students.

2. The Career Counselling Cell organised a 'Sanitary Health Campaign' on January 16, 2018 (Tuesday) for raising awareness among the students about health and sanitation related issues. The programme was conducted by the Company, Procter and Gamble India, within the college premises.

3. A seminar titled 'An Interactive Hour on CYBER SECURITY AWARENESS' was organised by the Career Counselling Cell of Victoria Institution (College) on 19th September, 2017 within College premises. Mr. Bivas Chatterjee, Public Prosecutor & Ethical Hacker, was the speaker of the day. Students and Faculty Members of the college participated in the seminar with great interest and enthusiasm.

4. The Counselling Cell arranged a programme on August 12, 2017 for the students of the college regarding the awareness of traffic rules. The programme – SAFE DRIVE SAVE LIFE was hosted by the Traffic Police Section of Government of West Bengal, Sealdah Division, Kolkata. The participants were the students of the college (Day Section).

5. A "Sit and Draw" competition was organised under the aegis of the Counselling Cell in collaboration with UCO Bank (Rajabazar Branch) on 26.10. 2017 at Keshub Memorial Hall to observe the Vigilance Awareness Week (Oct 30th to Nov 4th, 2017).

6. Students from the department of Zoology of Victoria Institution (College) took active part in quiz and extempore competition in the Zoo Festival 2017, from 14th November 2017 to 18th November 2017 organised by Alipore Zoological Gardens to spread awareness amongst students. It is worth mentioning that 4 out of the six students who participated in the extempore competition, two from the English category and two from the Bengali category, won consolation prizes for their encouraging performances.

7. A group of students of 2nd yr Honours of Botany, Chemistry & Zoology Departments participated in the Poster Competition on the theme "GLOBAL WATER CRISIS AND CONSERVATION" held at Scottish Church College on 10th January 2018. The group achieved 1st position

8. Philosophy Department organised an Extension Lecture on 15.09.2017. Dr. Pralayankar Bhattacharya of Calcutta University delivered his lecture to departmental students on "Democracy, Freedom and Education".

9. 2nd yr Students of Zoology Hons. Visited Zoological Survey of India, the premier Indian organization in zoological research and studies on 26th October 2017to have a keen observation of huge number of animal specimens.

10. 17 Students of 1st year Mathematics Honours participated in the celebration of 'National Mathematics Day 'at K K Das College on 22nd December 2017. Two teams participated in the Quiz Competition and one of them came 1st among the eleven teams from various colleges. Our students had also participated in Poster Presentation Competition where among the 12 different groups from various colleges, Group -II was declared 2nd and Group -I was declared 3rd. This gave the students a good exposure to the outer academic world.

11. 1st yr, 2nd yr and 3rd yr. students of Psychology (Hons.) participated in the Mental Health Week at Ashutosh College and University of Calcutta.

12. 1st yr & 2nd yr students of Economics Hons. Visited Sabala Mela, Central Park, Karunamoyee, Saltlake, Kolkata on 16th Dec 2017 for Primary Survey on socio-economic condition of self-help people.

13. The Dept. of Political Science has successfully completed conducting the 3rd series of Extension lectures for students of Pol.Sc. and Allied Social Sciences with the financial assistance received from Indian Council of Social Science Research-Eastern Regional Centre, Kolkata. In the last academic session the series comprised of 8 lectures beginning in November 2017 and ending in February 2018.

14. The Dept. of Economics arranged extension lectures by eminent Professors for curricular development of their 1st yr, 2nd yr & 3rd yr Hons. Students on 3rd & 10th January 2018.

15. The Dept. of Physics organised a Lecture and Demonstration of some innovative experiments by scientists from UGC DAE Consortium, Kolkata Centre on 20th Sept 2017 for the students of 1st yr, 2nd yr & 3rd yr Hons. students to enhance their curricular development.

16. Study tours were arranged by the Dept. of Physics to visit the Birla Industrial and Technological Museum on 20th February 2018 and also the Variable Energy Cyclotron Centre on 15^{th} Feb 2018 for the students of $1^{\text{st}} \& 2^{\text{nd}}$ yr Hons.

17. Department of History arranged a day trip to Pandua, Tribeni and Chandernagore on 23rd December, 2017 with Fifty (50) students along with three teachers.

18. Seasonal flowers were planted by the volunteers of NSS unit in the college garden.

19. During 2nd August to 15th August'17 NSS Volunteers were engaged in cleaning their college campus including class room, laboratories, libraries, toilets, lawns and roads.

20. Declamation contest on 'Patriotism and Nation Building' was held on 1st December 2017 at College premises, sponsored by Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India. The three winners (1st, 2nd, & 3rd) from our college attended the District level contest as contestants and one of them was awarded with certificate.

21. A programme of 'Neighbourhood Youth Parliament' under National Youth Leaders programme, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India was organized by Nehru Yuva Kendra, Kolkata in collaboration with NSS Unit of this college. Twenty four Volunteers of our unit took part in this programme, they discussed on various issues of local and national importance on current affairs including various Govt. activities.

22. A special camp of seven days (23th March-29th March 2018) was held in the Ward No .38 of Kolkata Municipal Corporation and this camp was attended by 50 NSS volunteers of our College.

This Special Camping programme was held to provide opportunities to the students for group living, collective experience sharing and constant interaction with the community. The volunteers of N.S.S Unit adopted a total of one hundred and twenty five families of the urban slum for intensive development. One drawing competition was also arranged by the Children of the slum with great interest. More than 50 slum children participated in this competition. Clipboard, drawing sheets, colour pencil, eraser and Tiffin were served by the volunteers to the children.

23. Students were awarded 4 Gold medals, 2 Silver medals at the South Asian Aquatic Champions, 2016, Colombo (Srilanka).

24. Students were awarded 1 Silver medal, in the West Bengal State Kick Boxing Championship and Gold medal at the National Kick Boxing championship 2017 and 2018.

- ii. <u>NSS, NCC, and other Credible Value Development Institutions-</u> The Institution believes in not only imparting the highest levels of academic excellence to the students, but also engrains in them core values necessary for the overall development of self and others. To further this, our students are encouraged to actively take part in activities of the National Service Scheme, and the National Cadet Corps. Educating themselves on important issues like the protection of the environment, the necessity of gender sensitization, and the significance of striking a proper balance between one's health, or the work-life conundrum is a pre-requisite for the Institution.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

A Rigorous and Credible Mechanism to Track the Progress and Academic Advancement of Students of the Institution-

- i. <u>Periodic Evaluations and Advancements-</u> The College conducts periodical evaluation in the form of class tests, mid- term tests, and pre-annual selection tests to equip the students with knowledge and skill of their chosen subjects and to provide them credible opportunities for all round academic and non-academic growth and prepare them for future life. Performance of students is also monitored through tutorial classes and assignments. Some departments evaluate the students by MCQ assessments and IQ tests.
- ii. <u>Updating of Student Data Records-Every</u> department of the College maintains student data record which contains contact details of the students. Faculty members of respective departments generally maintain regular contact with meritorious students to track their progression and career advancement. In addition to maintaining records, the faculty members motivate students and offer them career guidance that helps them in preparing for life after the college.





6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

• Affiliated to the oldest and one of the most prestigious universities in India, the University of Calcutta, the college prepares its academic curriculum in strict compliance with its parent university. The preparation of the academic calendar takes place right before the commencement of every academic session without any delay, so that the plan and the actionable points re clear to all the faculty members as well as the administrators. On the basis of the academic calendar, the teachers prepare their individual lesson plans according to the respective syllabit taught by them. The faculty also maintains an attendance register on a regular basis, which helps them to keep a track of the classes allotted and the classes taken.

Advanced and Novel methods of Teaching and Learning have been embraced and espoused generously by the Institution-

- i. <u>Model Teaching Methods-</u>While continuing with the formal processes of imparting education, robust attempts have been made towards experimenting and implementing new models like advanced Audio-Visual mediums such as LCD Projectors, Documentary Screenings, and Autobiography Screenings to enhance the quality of lectures, student interactions, and academic discussions within the atmosphere of the classrooms.
- ii. <u>Enhanced Academic Experiences-Student-teacher</u> discussions where students are encouraged to participate in a discourse with teachers, purely in an academic and educational environment. The enrichment is heightened by inviting learned and accomplished speakers who interact and share their experiences with the students which helps in contributing towards a wider world view. Academic and experiential tours and visits to institutions, historical monuments, museums, student conferences helps in mitigating the mundaneness of classroom teaching and in ameliorating academic and non-academic thinking and thought building.
- iii. <u>Harnessing the Power of the Internet-</u>The World Wide Web and its academic potential is routinely taken recourse to by teachers and students. Online resources and digital libraries that store the most updated and newest forms of academic literature compliment the traditional models of books, and study materials.
- iv. <u>Keeping abreast with the Information Technology Revolution-Digitization in education and</u> academic knowledge building is one of the key tenets that the Institution wants to aggressively build upon in the next five years. With this aim, interactive educational resources are distributed via CDs, and students are encouraged to compile reports of excursions on a digital platform that is shareable and accessible to all, teachers, as well as students.
- v. <u>The Importance of Attending Workshops-</u> To inculcate a process of continuous learning, as well as its applications, students from the Institution are encouraged to take part in routine academic and non-academic workshops that are held. This helps in increasing interaction with other students of different colleges, and universities, as well as it exposes them to new form of positive influences, which help in their overall academic development.
- vi. <u>Experiential Visits to locations of Academic Interests-</u>The institution believes that academic knowledge is enhanced if complimented by the proper sources and resources of academic experiences. To further the ideal, students are taken on academic visits that correspond to their curriculum and syllabuses.
- vii. <u>Paper Presentations and Attendance in Seminars-</u>Understanding and absorbing knowledge is half the battle won, articulating and sharing the same with others on a public platform is another. To help boost confidence and overcome the fear of public speaking students are encouraged to present academic papers and make presentations in different intra-college and inter-college events. This not only helps as a confidence building measure, but also helps in improving the quality of research, answering rebuttals, and defending academic arguments.
- viii. <u>Periodic Assessments to Measure Growth and Development-</u> As learning is a continuous process, the Institution makes it a point to evaluate the students regularly through routine MCQ tests, class tests, and college tests. This helps the teachers in accurately assessing particular pressure points that emerge as challenges, and addressing the same before university examinations.
 - ix. <u>Judiciously Planned Parent-Teacher Meetings or PTMs-</u>The Institution believes that it is very important for parents to be updated with the academic progress of their children, and the Institution ensures that there is complete transparency in communication between teachers, administrators, students and parents. Regular, planned and periodic PTMs are key in developing a healthy, confident and trust building atmosphere at the Institution.
 - x. <u>Extracurricular Developments like Inter-Departmental Quiz Competitions-</u> The Institution makes it a point to routinely organize inter-departmental quiz competitions as the same helps in keeping students abreast with important happenings from the world of current affairs and political developments that concern each and every citizen of the country. Mental awareness, confidence building, value addition of extra knowledge, along with the development of the overall individual personality are some of the goals achieved through holding quiz competitions.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Periodic Examination and Continuous Evaluation Models-

- i. The examinations according to the academic plan and calendar are regularly held and scrupulously monitored. The examinations are planned well before hand, and students are supplied with all the resources including probable and important questions that are a must for the examination at hand.
- ii. All the examinations in terms of dates and scheduling are done in strict accordance with the mandates of the affiliated university, the University of Calcutta.
- iii. In order to ensure regular advancement, and the tracking of the enhanced levels of student's knowledge, the Institution conducts its own periodic evaluation formats. These take the form of regular class tests, monthly assessments, viva-voce, mid-terms, pre-annual selection examinations, presentations, and any other innovative method of assessment followed by the individual academic departments.
- iv. Newer models of evaluations like Multiple Choice Questions (MCQs), Intelligent Quotient (IQ) Tests are also conducted to train the students to be sharp and updated with the education that is being imparted by the faculty members.
- v. The IQAC introduces programmes to ensure accountability with transparency in teaching practices and assessment patterns. The College interacts with students through different Orientation Programmes and Parent-Teacher meetings and receives valuable and enriching feedback from them. The College uses these feedbacks in planning its strategies especially in bringing transparency and accountability in the teaching-learning evaluation.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Innovative Strides towards Promoting Excellence in Research and Development-

- i. The IQAC ensures that the faculty members of the Institution are abreast with the most updated methods of teaching and evaluation, one that has been accredited by regulatory bodies such as the Ministry of Human Resource, the University Grants Commission, and the State Education Boards. The Institution ensures that the teachers must have access to institutional infrastructure facility to carry out research work. Many of the teachers of the college are involved in active research in collaboration with external bodies. The IQAC keeps the teachers informed about various projects and fellowships and motivates them to submit proposals for minor and major research projects to the requisite funding agencies. The college ensures the autonomy of the Principal Investigator and facilitates release of funds. The college grants study leave to the faculty engaged in research work as and when required.
- ii. The IQAC regularly takes initiative to inform the teachers about various academic and nonacademic workshops, seminars, and conferences. The faculty members are encouraged to enrich and add to their learning and development by the Institution. Getting published in reputed journals and books is a value addition that is taken quite seriously by the Institution.
- iii. The teachers are also encouraged to go on Faculty Development Programs which are regularly held by the UCG. In addition, the Institution helps faculty members complete their PhD, and offers flexibility in terms of benefits and responsibilities.
- iv. The teachers are encouraged to actively take part in Faculty development programmes like Orientation Programme, Refresher Courses and Workshops to enhance their skills and expertise. This results in improved delivery of lectures which leads to quality education. These programmes play a supreme role to update the teachers about the latest happenings in their respective fields.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

C. Process or System Thinking

College Authority and Library Committee help the Librarian in decision making for quality functioning of the library and provides all kinds of necessary assistance.

D. Library Staff Involvement

Library staff are motivated to give their full commitment to help the user to get the library service. They are trained to keep the arrangement of library resources in proper sequence along with the housekeeping jobs in library to make the library a comfortable centre for retrieving the required resources, learning and knowledge sharing.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College encourages quality improvement programmes and allows human resource development. Service Books of the employees are continuously upgraded.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- Permanent faculties are recruited through College Service Commission and these appointments are approved by the Governing Body of the college.
- Govt. Approved Part time teachers are recruited by the College following the Govt. guidelines. College whole time teachers and guest lecturers are appointed by the college.
- Approval of the vacant posts from the Government is required for recruitment of the nonteaching staff. Applications are then invited through advertisement in leading newspapers and college website. Candidates are selected after written test and interview by the Screening Committee constituted by the Governing Body.


Ten relevant parameters were identified on which the students were requested to rate the individual teachers on a scale of 1 to 4, in an increasing order of satisfaction.



Feedback parameters for Teachers



- 10. Overall rating of the Teacher







Feedback to teachers by 3rd yr. Hons. students 2018




Dept of Sanskrit




Feedback to teachers by 3rd yr. Hons.students 2018





















2. From Alumni

Objective

Feedback was sought from the alumni for the academic and administrative benefits they received from the college with the objective of identifying areas where improvements can be made and overall performance is maximized.

Method

Alumni were asked to provide their views on the academic and administrative conditions they received in the course of their academic period in the college. Individual feedback forms were distributed and they were asked to fill up forms in a controlled environment within a prescribed amount of time.


Thirteen relevant parameters were identified on which the alumni were requested to rate the college on a 4-point scale 1 to 4(Unsatisfactory, Satisfactory, Good, Excellent) in an increasing order of satisfaction.

The feedback forms were collected from the Alumni, summarized manually and then represented in a graphical form. Then Average rating of the college was analysed by representing in graphical forms on the criteria mentioned below. Subsequently the departments and college administration were suggested to improve their performance on the basis of this feedback.

Practice 1

TITLE: Giving Emphasis on Teaching-Learning Method

OBJECTIVE:

Elevating and augmenting the level of academic efficiency of the students of the Institution

CONTEXTS:

There is an inherent link between education and technological innovations. Even though the institution does not have the luxury of unlimited resources at its disposal, it still attempts to provide the highest levels of academic excellence by integrating technology in its models and methods of teaching.

PRACTICES:

i. The administration and faculty members of the institution strive to inculcate the use of AV mediums like projectors in regular classroom teaching. The projectors also act as an invaluable asset for students of literature who grasp the visual imagery and are better to align it to the words of the writer. In addition to this, films that would stir the minds and imaginations of the students are regularly screened to impart creativity and break the monotony of daily classroom lectures. Other aspects like power-point presentations, seminars, talks, and other academic engagements have immensely benefitted from the continued use of projectors and other AV mediums.

The ultimate aim of all the above academic integrations with AV equipment is to impart a more cohesive all-round development of the students of the Institution.

- ii. A library is often a temple to intellectual pursuits, and the Institution has realised the need for maintaining the library as one of the most conducive academic environments on campus. A fully equipped library with state-of-the-art software helmed by a dedicated librarian ensures that the students are always content whenever they visit the library.
- iii. The Integrated Library Management Software- 'KOHA' allows access to the online public access catalogue, better known in academic circles as 'OPAC'. Infrastructure wise- clean reading rooms, photocopying facilities also help in providing a robust

academic environment. CAS and SDI are two different facilities, which provide current awareness and selective dissemination of information respectively.

- iv. The OPAC is an online service that is found to exist in very select institutions across the country. To further strengthen our online resources the Institution plans to subscribe to online journal and circulation. Above all, a rich collection of reference books and efficient lending facilities enable the teachers and students to accomplish their academic interests.
- v. The college has viable laboratories for different science departments. Advanced programs like C++ and FORTRAN programming is taught in the departments of Mathematics, Physics respectively. Department of Geography uses GIS. The students of Departments of Botany, Zoology and Economics have accessibility to the computers to complete their projects and assignments. The Department of Chemistry has the facility of Spectrophotometer.
- vi. Separate and individual laboratories are essential to allow students ample time in working on their academics. To this end, the Institution ensures the presence of individual IT laboratories for the Departments of Commerce and Journalism & Mass-communication. The Department of Commerce has the facility to teach professional computer mediums that are highly desirable in the world like MS WORD, MS EXCEL, MS POWERPOINT and TALLY.
- vii. The presence of a sizable auditorium, one in which college programs and student presentations are held is an imperative for any educational institution. The college has a substantially spacious auditorium to assemble the entire college. Various seminars and cultural activities are conducted in the auditorium, which creates a sense of solidarity among the students.
- viii. In keeping with the demands that the era of modern education is ushering in, one that is beneficial to the students, the college has established a seminar hall with the facility of smart board.

EVALUATING OUR SUCCESS

i. The students who are willing to pursue their career in software companies and the Information Technology Industry benefit substantially from learning C++ and FORTRAN programming languages. If they plan to take up further studies around programming, the enhanced programming learning helps them adequately prepare for MCA courses. The courses make the students more employable and professionally trained.

- ii. Tally is the basic accounting software for the students, who want to be commerceprofessionals.
- iii. WORD, EXCEL help the students to compete in KPO and BPO agencies. POWERPOINT is indispensable for pursuing further academic career and professionals.
- iv. The Journalism & Mass-communication students use MS-ACORD.
- v. The software and facilities available in the library equip the students for future academic persuasion. The students interested in library science have access to OPAC to further their career prospects.

This practice attempts to make the students more competent for employment as well as for higher education.

FUTURE CHALLENGES, AND THE WAY FORWARD-

A steep increase in the number of students has led to space constraints. There is a need for more classrooms and laboratories to help the students cope to the best of their abilities in their academic programs. The auditorium needs to be updated by integrating advanced acoustics and air-conditioning facilities. Along with tangible challenges there are certain obligations that an educational Institution has towards its society and its country.

First, we need to raise the level of degree completion. Most Indians will certainly need education beyond high school to prosper economically. But with degree attainment holding steady for over a generation at about one-third of the population, we must find ways to help a much higher percentage of Indians prepare for college and actually complete their degrees—three years. We must do this to help Indians fulfil their own hopes for the future and to maintain our global leadership.

Second, we must ensure that the college degree represents high levels of educational challenge and accomplishment. To stay competitive in the global knowledge economy, employers now actively seek graduates who possess broad knowledge in areas such as science, the global context, and diverse cultures. They also look for graduates with sophisticated analytical, quantitative, and technological skills; excellent communication and intercultural capacities; and the ability to apply their knowledge creatively to real-world challenges and settings. Sixty-three percent of employers report that many college graduates fall short on these expectations. The world itself is demanding more of college graduates than ever before, and we, as a community, must use our creativity to help all our students meet these high expectations.

Third, we must help the public and our students recognize that higher education has an obligation to democracy as well as to the economy. Today, our country faces daunting challenges at home

as well as abroad. A college degree should ensure that graduates are knowledgeable about their democratic, cultural, and global heritage and well prepared to contribute, as engaged and active citizens, to the work of renewing the public square and helping to solve life-threatening problems at home and around the globe.

Finally, college education will need to foster these high levels of college attainment for students and communities that, historically, have been underserved at all levels of the Indian educational system. College access and degree completion are still sharply stratified by income and ethnicity. But with the demographic composition of Indian society now changing very rapidly, India can maintain its economic and civic vitality only if it reverses these inherited inequities. We must make a new commitment to help thousands of students from traditionally underserved communities both enrol in college and graduate well prepared—for creative and successful careers, for civic participation, and for fulfilling lives.

PRACTICE 2

TITLE: Cultivating a sense of social responsibility and awareness amongst students in the institute

OBJECTIVE:

Empowering women by uplifting the less privileged sections of the society.

CONTEXT:

The College is situated near one of the busiest railway stations (Sealdah) of Kolkata that connects semi-urban and rural areas. Most of our students hail from a financially humble background and reside in semi-urban areas. Unfortunately, due to the paucity of good educational institutions they are unable to pursue higher academics in these far-flung areas. Victoria Institution offers a credible and safe abode to these students.

PRACTICES:

NCC ACTIVITY: The students of NCC unit of the college have participated in different extracurricular activities like rifle shooting, trekking at national level competitions. Participation in music competitions at the inter-college levels has also been encouraged by the management and administration. These activities develop their confidence, nurture their talents and help them gain fame in competitions at various levels. NSS ACTIVITY: Victoria Institution (College) has a Unit of the National Service Scheme, which engages student volunteers in different community development programs in the neighbouring area of the College. The aim is to understand community-building exercises, and alleviate the condition of the neighbouring areas, which is not very economically developed and habited by underprivileged sections of the society.

SELF-DEFENCE: Kickboxing training is given to our students by experts deployed from the Police Department of West Bengal Govt. under the scheme of 'Sukanya project' for self-defence of girls.

EVALUATING OUR SUCCESS

The orientation to help the marginalized section of the society is an important facet for a responsible citizen. Our students volunteer with NGOs and other social groups to serve the less privileged sections of the society. The students also compete at national level competitions and stages, and glorify the prestige of their alma mater.

Within this short period, students of our college proved their mettle, training and efficacy by participating in Inter-college, State & National Kickboxing competitions. They have won a number of awards and certifications in different competitions.

FUTURE CHALLENGES, AND THE WAY FORWARD-

- Our fundamental aim as an academic institution is to nurture and cultivate professionally successful individuals. To this end, we feel that the release of substantive funds will aid one of our core ideals- to develop women entrepreneurs, who would in turn be trained to develop self-help groups. These groups will help community building exercises but have a strong economic foundation.
- If substantive funds for the same are allotted to the Institution, a proper course of action can be chalked out by planning yearlong activities aimed to develop the above stated proposition.
- In order to enhance the extra-curricular programs and activities the Institution intends to avail the services of experts and practitioners from fields like Pottery Making, Glass Painting, and Ceramic Works to help students develop an interest in them, either as a hobby, or as a professional commitment that they would wish to take up in the future. This has huge potential and demand from the market, and in the process we might support the dreams and aspirations of some budding entrepreneurs.

SWOC Analysis of the Institution

Strengths:

- An appropriate and cordial academic environment that is complimented by an increased demand from girl students who wish to be a part of the encouraging environment.
- Strict guidelines that adhere to the principles, rules and conduct of the Affiliating University (Calcutta University) are followed meticulously in terms of academic regulations.
- All around student development is encouraged with programs like the National Service Scheme (NSS), along with a host of extra-curricular activities, both academic, as well as non-academic.
- Encouraging first generation learners (girl child) from the minority communities by affording them satisfactory enrolment percentages.

Weaknesses:

- Some of the subjects are plagued by challenges of not having the appropriate or designated number of faculty members assigned to them.
- Infrastructural deficiencies in terms of teaching and class-room spaces, apart from ideal laboratory physical coverage.
- An imminent need to develop better post college opportunities for students by a robust optimisation of the Placement Cell/Committee.

Opportunities:

- A significant percentage of students have shown the academic appetite to pursue higher education given their correct indoctrination into the subject and course curriculums aided by an efficient teaching/faculty body.
- Inter departmental academic coordination to encourage and promote Inter disciplinary research work to be initiated.
- Initiation of Professional Certificate Courses to develop the requisite levels of soft skills for teaching & non-teaching staff.
- Regular academic interventions in terms of organising conferences and workshops for students and faculty members alike.

Challenges:

- A fundamental challenge is to uplift the students from poor socio-economic backgrounds and instil in them the desire to educate themselves to seek better career opportunities.
- The creation and establishment of a state-of-the-art Book Bank Facility in library for the students.
- Full automation of Central Library.
